Reducing Emissions

- > Technology and capital investments in America's Global Freight Gateway – Southern California
- > Improvements at the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach
- > Funding for electric buses and expanded bus routes

Safer Roads

Filling More Potholes

- Funding for cities to:
- > Repair potholes and sidewalks
 - > Repave local streets
 - > Improve pedestrian and bike safety, and upgrade bus shelters
 - > Fix damaged roadways and improve bridge safety

Smoother Commutes

- > Improving freeway traffic flow/safety on the I-605/SR-91 Interchange
- > I-710 South/I-5 South/I-605 South pavement rehab projects
- > Technology upgrades to monitor traffic on the I-405 South and SR-91
- > Funding for the Freeway Service Patrol to relieve congestion on highways

Stretching your Measure M Dollars

- > Building the West Santa Ana Branch Transit Corridor to connect downtown Los Angeles to the Gateway Cities
- > Completing the I-710 South Early Action Project at Shoemaker Bridge
- > Expanding network of bike lanes and Safe Routes to School street improvements

GATEWAY CITIES SUBREGION

The state is investing approximately \$1 billion per year in new transportation funding in LA County from the gas taxes and fees authorized by Senate Bill 1 (SB 1), the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. Assuming this funding stays in place, this money will help to build transportation projects in LA County over the next 10 years.
